# THE SCHOOLHOUSE DURING FLOODS

With the recent floods, we were reminded of Governor Macquarie intentionally setting the original township of Wilberforce up high to avoid the severe floods that impacted the farms along the Hawkesbury River. He wanted to offer the community a place of refuge during those times. During the floods, the Schoolhouse has been used as a safe place for families to be kept high and dry while the river rose.





### SHARING HISTORY

Recently we welcomed students from years 3 and 4 at Wilberforce Public School to the Schoolhouse to take a tour of the historic building and learn about the history of the site. It was a great time of sharing about colonial Australia and the roots of schooling that would eventually lead to the beginnings of their own school. They had some great questions and seemed to really enjoy learning about our shared history.

# SCHOOLMASTER SPOTLIGHT – JOSEPH NASH (1871-1874)

It took some research to find anything on this elusive schoolmaster. It appears that Joseph Frederick Nash was born in Sussex, England in 1840. He married Louisa Ann Bichard in Mauritius in 1865, where he is listed as teacher, before travelling to Australia. They had 5 children while at Wilberforce. He had a relatively short teaching stint there before he is mentioned in a correspondence piece in 1874 where the author claims to know Mr Nash well, finding him to be an excellent teacher and the criticism that had been levelled at him was unwarranted. He went back to England about 1880 and had 4 more children. He went back to working in shipping before he died in 1913.
